
Reasons for Not Voting Among Adults Unable to Work

Universe: Missing voters (8.0 million citizens who did not vote)



Why Didn't Adults Unable to Work Vote in November 2018?

- **Illness or disability** affected either the missing voter or a family member who required care, and was the top reason for not voting (34.6%) among adults unable to work in 2018.
- ◆ **Apathy** ("not interested in the election or politics"), **aversion** ("don't like the candidates or issues"), **or futility** ("my vote doesn't matter") prevented voting by 29.9% of missing voters who were unable to work.
- Systemic or logistical barriers (13.9% of missing voters) included the following: "did not know where or how to register;" "did not meet residency requirements;" "registration or absentee ballot problems;" "inconvenient polling place, hours, or lines;" "out of town;" "not eligible to vote;" "difficulty with English;" "transportation problems;" and "bad weather conditions."
- ◆ **Deadlines or timing** ("missed registration deadline;" "forgot to vote;" "too busy;" or "conflicting schedule") prevented voting by 7.6% of missing voters.

Please note that some numbers may appear not to add up correctly due to rounding. Citizens include civilian, non-military, non-institutionalized persons. Women were 50.4% of this group. Voting data are from the Current Population Survey (November 2018). Reasons for not voting were compiled from two questions, and responses imputed for persons with missing data.
